Valley Giving Guide Thanks And Our Plans for The Future

Thanks to the generous donors, the WWBWC was able to raise \$3,362.40 throughout the month of giving last winter.

At WWBWC, staff work collaboratively to submit grant proposals for funding from government agencies, foundations, and other sources. These funds have historically been the majority of our funding. While we have been able to perform successful project development, monitoring and evaluation programs, and implement multiple restoration projects in the basin with these dollars, these allocated funds are restricted.

Impactful donations, like those made through the Valley Giving Guide, are flexible funds that are still few and far between for our organization. Throughout 2024, our goal is to raise \$27,500 in donated dollars.

Our organization will utilize these funds for things our grant funding is unable to be utilized for such as building our capacity, long-term sustainability of our organization, and education and recharge programs.
